

and besides, there's the question of talent



Acrostic poem: spells a word or name with the first letter of each line



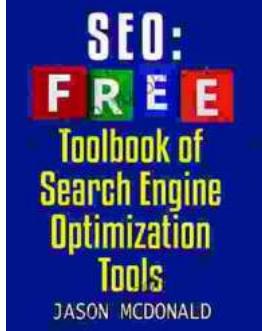

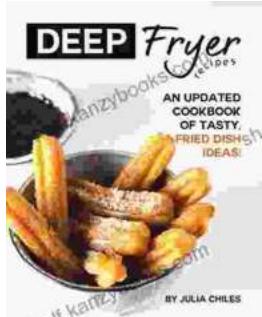
