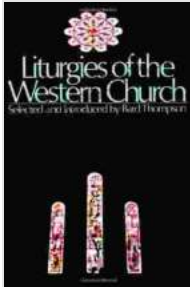

The **Sacrament of Holy Orders** is the sacrament that ordains men to the priesthood. Holy Orders gives the priest the power to celebrate the sacraments and to preach the Gospel.

The **Sacrament of Matrimony** is the sacrament that unites a man and a woman in marriage. It is celebrated by the priest or deacon blessing the couple and saying the words, "I join you together in marriage in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Matrimony is a lifelong covenant between a man and a woman that is open to the possibility of children.

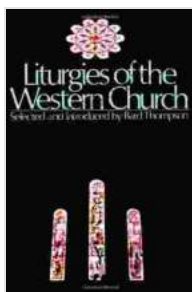
The liturgical year is divided into three seasons: Advent, Christmas, and Lent. Advent is a time of preparation for the birth of Christ. Christmas is a

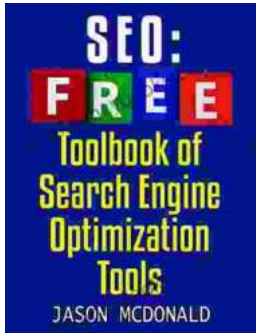


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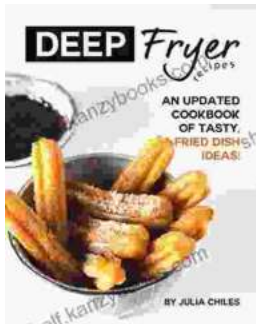
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
